### Monitoring your children's exposure to negative influences

Influences from outside of school can have a dramatic effect on what happens at school. It is a reality that today's children are exposed to a myriad of influences that affect their daily lives and not all positively. We see many 'trending' behaviours at school that children pick up from exposure to various media (TV, YouTube, Social Media platforms etc.). They also learn quickly, second hand, from their peers exposed to the previous list as well as older siblings.

Lately, we have seen an increase in negative comments, ideas and actions directly linked to Netflix Dramas meant for adults or adult focused cartoons (Family Guy, South Park and the like). Student's perceptions of appropriate ways to express their feelings verbally or physically need more adult supervision and parenting than ever before.

Please understand that despite your child finding humour in these shows they do not, developmentally, fully understand, nor can process, how to appropriately manage the content. Often these influences play out on the playground through inappropriate games, comments and actions. At the school we cannot be the main filter to support positive, age appropriate media influences. Please limit your child's use of technology & monitor it vigorously. Handing a powerful tool, such as an iPad, or Smartphone to a child and expecting them to make good choices is unfair. Parents, unintentionally, have set them up for failure and potential harm that is lasting. Unless you are able to sit beside them and interact directly with them, as they use technology, the implications can be problematic.

These are very interesting and challenging times to be a parent. What is easy and convenient is rarely the right decision these days. Parenting is hard work and technology has more pitfalls than one would expect. Addiction to technology is just the beginning. Limiting exposure is key to healthy children. There is a host of good research to back this up. We all want our children to grow up healthy and happy. Please consider your part in this process and make decisions that are in the best interest of the child first and foremost.
